THE QUIZZICAL WOODTURNER

1/ Why do woodworkers often seal the ends of green timber with paint or wax?

2/ Eve offered Adam fruit from what species of tree?

3/ Many turners try to keep their tools sharpened at about 30 degrees. To achieve this angle the bevel should be same length as the thickness of the tool. True or false?

4/ Some turners use a slipstone to improve the edges of their gouges after grinding. If one part of the slipstone is overused a hollow will be formed. How can the hollows in slipstones be removed?

5/ When were iron tools first forged; 1400 BC or 1400 AD?

ANSWERS

1/ Moisture leaves the ends of logs more quickly than elsewhere. Sealing the ends slows this process and can reduce splitting.

2/ Eve offered Adam fruit from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil. Legend has it that the fruit was an apple but the Bible makes no mention of this.

3/ False. If the bevel is the same length as the thickness of the tool then the tool will be ground at 45 degrees. To achieve a 30 degree angle the bevel should be twice as long as the thickness of the tool. A typical detail gouge is 8 mm thick [from the bottom of the tool to the bottom of the flute] so to grind it at 30 degrees the bevel should be 16 mm long.

4/ One way to true a slipstone [or a flatstone] is to wet a flat cement surface and rub the stone across it till the high spots are flattened.

5/ The ancient Hittites [modern Syria] first forged iron tools in about 1400 BC. This marked the beginning of the iron age.
