Cherry Tree Update.2



In 2008 Blue Mountains Woodturners organised a huge shindig at the Heritage-listed Tahlia House at Lawson. The catalyst for this venture was an old cherry tree that grew in the grounds of Tahlia House.

The tree had been presented in 1916 to the Tahlia House Girls School by a Japanese business representative in appreciation for the excellent education his two daughters had received. However, by 2005 the tree had to be removed to allow widening of the Great Western Highway (GWH).

Members of Blue Mountains Woodturners made small mementoes out of the wood from the old cherry tree, and these were presented to various dignitaries and to descendants of former pupils of the school. The presentation ceremony on 10th May 2008 was attended by more than 70 people and a new Cherry Tree – provided by the Japanese Consul-General – was planted in the somewhat truncated front yard of Tahlia House.

The new tree is doing OK (see Photo 1) but it is completely overshadowed by 'wildling' cherry tree that has sprouted on the verge of the GWH just outside the grounds of Tahlia House (See Photo 2) – not quite the

result that had been hoped for in 2008! More glumly, the commemorative plaque (also presented by the Japanese community) and installed near the new tree has gone missing with only it's mounting post remaining. I did not photograph the plaque when it was presented so have no idea of its wording. Perhaps some long-standing member has an image of the missing plaque?

THE OPAL TABLE - AN AUSTRALIAN COLLABORATION

Take a trip back to 1999 when three of our current members [Des Lane, Brian Smith and myself] belonged to The Sydney Woodturners Guild.

Ask 9 artists, a gem dealer and 38 woodturners to make a table. Give them strict instructions - each leg is to be decorated - any number of people can make a leg - it has to be fun. Sit back and let your eyes widen, except that you can't sit back when there are so many ideas flowing, so many animated discussions, so many elegant, bizarre, kitsch and ridiculous table legs.



I wander around the clubhouse and gape at the legs, one in the form of a saucy doll, another made from 16 species of wood. A reverse-turned leg has a turned 'flower' inside. The stem, which is 170 mm long and only 1.5 mm in diameter, quivers at the slightest touch. There are legs which have borrowed from classical furniture styles: 17th century French, 16th century German, Ancient Greek, Chinese and Egyptian.

A man of fifty is beaming as a young woman paints a mermaid on his turning. 'Come on! Look at this!' he insists, as if we are present at the creation of the world. Another fellow is guided through his first experience of off-centre work to turn

a leg on 5 centres, his mentor as dedicated as any midwife.

Nearby, a white-haired elder holds forth to a young man he has cornered, 'I had to turn this leg in 2 parts. My little lathe only takes 6 inches between centres.' The leg has 14 captive rings but as the young man reaches for it his arm is grabbed, and



another leg is thrust forward. This one comprises 15 or 20 interlocking rings that form a wooden chain. 'This is an adjustable leg,' says the older man, raising and lowering the chain, 'It's always just the right length to reach the floor, no matter how high the table is.'

A meticulous turner who normally makes conventional furniture, hands his first reverse-turned leg over to a painter. She is delighted with its refined line and when she hands it back, transformed by colour and pattern, she says, 'The outside is the carnival of life, the inside is the heart.'

A leg in the form of a rolling pin has a written invitation, 'Turn me, burn me, spin me, twirl me, roll me, stroke me, don't stop.' Its

maker, a woman with a hint of mischief in her smile, watches as you spin the rolling pin.

Can this really be a meeting of the Sydney Woodturners Guild? A club with a strong bent towards traditional turning is on the slippery slide to art. Not everyone approves of all this reckless creativity. 'What will we do with the table when its finished?' asks a club stalwart. 'Display it at the woodturning symposium in Newcastle then try to sell it for \$1000...for Westmead Children's Hospital'. This reply is received in skeptical silence. No matter, the pyrography and painting continue, the bleaching, blanching and staining, a rainbow of colour.

A retired truck driver does something he has never done before. He picks up a paintbrush, dips it into a bright red glob and starts to paint his turning.



The asking price for the table goes up.

The rim of the Japanese bronze cedar [chrymptamaria japonica] tabletop is textured with an Arbortech carver and then the opal chips in the top of the table begin to glitter as the clear resin above them is polished with finer and finer pastes. The gem dealer who donated the opals is asked how much they are worth, 'Not much.' What does 'Not much', mean to a dealer? The question is repeated and his wife, also a gem dealer, is emphatic, '\$1000 retail'.



As the workshop winds down an artist declares, 'This is the most fun I have ever had painting.' She is grinning. I am curious about a fiftyish man who appears to have spent half the day in a trance and ask him if he enjoyed himself. 'This is the best day I have ever had.' We grab brooms and start sweeping up.

A few weeks later the opal table is finished. It has 42 legs but there are another 20 legs that won't fit so we start on a second table. Six months later the opal table is the centrepiece of the club's exhibit at the international wood turning symposium in Newcastle and wins us first prize for the best club display, an \$800 bandsaw and it was shown in the English magazine, *Woodturning*. Now everyone knows that the turners of Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains are bold and clever. But the doubters shake their heads. 'No one will pay \$2500 for that.' They are right but the table eventually sells, for \$2000. The Children's Hospital is better off...and we are too.
